EXTENSION OF LEAVE.

No 521.—The Governor in Council is pleased to declare under the provisions of section 16 of the Madras Forest Act (V of 1882), that, from the 15th February 1908, the areas, the boundaries of which are set forth in the schedule below shall be constituted "reserved forests":—

Paduchari ..	<p>No. 1.—East of the Walayar railway station. <i>North</i>.—Starting from a point two hundred feet to the east from the centre of the railway line at the northern end of the station compound, the line runs east for a distance of one hundred and thirty feet. <i>East</i>.—Thence southwards for a distance of one thousand three hundred and fifty-three feet. <i>South</i>.—Thence westwards for a distance of two hundred and eighty feet where it meets the fence of the railway line. <i>West</i>.—Thence northwards along the above said fence for a distance of five hundred and fifty-five feet; thence eastwards along the southern boundary of the station compound for a distance of one hundred and fifty feet; thence northwards along the eastern boundary of the station compound for a distance of seven hundred and ninety-eight feet to the starting point.</p> <p>No. 2.—West of the Walayar railway station. <i>North</i>.—Starting from a point three hundred and thirty feet to the west from the centre of the railway line at the northern end of the station compound, the line runs east for a distance of two hundred and eighty feet and meets the fence of the railway line. <i>East</i>.—Thence southwards along the above said fence for a distance of one thousand three hundred and fifty-three feet. <i>South</i>.—Thence westwards for a distance of two hundred and eighty feet. <i>West</i>.—Thence northwards for a distance of one thousand three hundred and fifty-three feet in a straight line to the starting point.</p>

No. 522.—The Governor in Council is pleased to declare, under the provisions of section 4 of the Madras Forest Act (V of 1882), that it is proposed to constitute the land described in the schedule below a "reserved forest" under the Act:—

2. The Governor in Council is further pleased under clause (c) of the said section, to appoint the Revenue Divisional Officer, Sermadevi, to be the Forest Settlement-officer, who shall enquire into and determine the existence, nature and the extent of any rights claimed by, or alleged to exist in favour of, any person in or over the land comprised within such limits, or to any forest produce of such land, and deal with the same as provided in chapter II of the said Act; and the District Forest-officer, Tinnevelly, for the time being, to attend on behalf of Government during the enquiry.

3. The Governor in Council is further pleased, under the authority vested in him by section 14 of the Act, to appoint the Collector of Tinnevelly, for the time being, to be the officer of the Revenue Department, who shall hear appeals from the orders of the Forest Settlement-officer under sections 11, 12 and 13 of the Act.

DISEASES OF ANIMALS ACTS, 1894 to 1903.
NOTICE.

IMPORTATION OF HORSES, ASSES, AND MULES INTO GREAT BRITAIN.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries desire to call the attention of all concerned to the following provision contained in Article 2 of the Glanders or Farcy Order of 1907, which comes into force on the 1st January 1908:

No horse, ass, or mule, brought to Great Britain from any other country, except Ireland, the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man, shall be landed in Great Britain unless it is accompanied by a certificate of a veterinary surgeon to the effect that he examined the animal immediately found that the animal did not show symptoms of glanders or farcy, as the case may be, and that he
